Kathryn's review of the Celestial Olympia:

The most efficient way to visit Ephesus, Patmos, Rhodes, Crete, Santorini and Mykonos.

The Olympia is an older ship, so please don't think in terms of Holland America, Seabourn or Silversea. If you were fortunate enough to experience cruising in the 1980's you will recognize the small compact cabins. During the day you will tour two ports a day, so very little time is spent in your cabin.

We have included the top outside cabins in the cost of the cruise, with of course All gratuities, surcharges, shore excursions on Patmos, Rhodes, and Ephesus, allowing time for personal exploration and relaxation on Crete and Santorini. All alcoholic and nonalcoholic beverages throughout the cruise.

We have also negotiated low rates for the Jr. Suites, which are larger and will provide more room in the cabin. Please see the descriptions below.

You will definitely be traveling in a more comfortable style than St. Paul.

In 2015 , the Celestial Cruise Line refurbished cabins, as well as bathrooms for all inside and outside cabins, refurbished with modern furniture, light wood paneling, flat-screen TVs and new carpets.

XC Outside Cabins Included in tour price:

All XC cabins have the following features: Individual twin beds which can be combined into a double, two built-in wardrobes, a built-in vanity/desk with a small stool, wall-mounted mirror, two bedside tables with lamps, a wall-mounted TV with limited English channels (BBC,



Bloomberg, Sky News), a hair dryer, an ice bucket and a safe. All the bathrooms are tiled, with modern square sinks, a shower stall with curtain and wall-mounted generic shampoo, shower gel and lotion dispensers.

XC cabins measure 122 square feet and have a picture window.

Junior Suites:



242 square feet and recently refurbished, giving them a modern look and feel with light-colored wood paneling and dark green, patterned carpet. There are two distinct areas: a sleeping and living area (with the TV in the former). Furniture includes a full sofa, a glass table and two

bucket chairs. The bedside tables both have small reading lamps. The large picture window overlooks the promenade deck but the lifeboats prevent these rooms from having a view. The bathrooms are larger with a tub with shower.
